Because of the warm, humid weather, Glenn Symon (owner of Peaceable Hill Farm) suggested we run the dogs in shifts. Several pheasants had been released into the cover prior to our arrival. Bill put her up when the heat and humidity in the high cover became onerous.

Chase's Battle

A few of you know that Chase has been fighting cancer for the last year and a half or so. We have a superb hospital and oncologist up in Deerfield Mass. – Dr. Claire Weigand and the staff of “VESH” (Veterinary Emergency and Specialty Hospital). It all started with a terrible seizure that had Chase out for the count for some days (they had to induce a medical coma for his first few days there). That staff do miracles; Chase survived that terrible stretch, thanks to the excellent care by doctors and staff. He came home after a week and a half of hospitalization.

I went up every day to be with him, and the staff spoiled him rotten. When we went back for his first chemotherapy treatment, someone whispered over the intercom to the room where the in-patient dogs are kept, “Chase is here.” Suddenly the lobby was full of almost a dozen vet techs, all of whom had fallen in love with him and just had to see how well he was doing.

He did the full course of chemotherapy, which ended about a year ago now... and though he still has regular ultrasound and blood test checkups, there is – for now – no sign of the cancer! There is still no guarantee that the cure is permanent, but I'll take all the lifetime he can get.

He did start having seizures after the chemo ended, but he is on phenobarbital (likely for life), and he is now doing very well on it. (Note: a newer medicine, Kepra, reacted very badly – he had one seizure right after he had a dose; and it upset his digestion so that he could not take regular dog food, only “bland diet” of boiled chicken or burger). But on the phenobarbital, he's had no more seizures for the past four months or so, and he is enjoying life (especially at breakfast and dinnertime). He may not be able to resume his therapy work because of the risk of further seizures; but as long as he's free of them for now, life is good. Just wish us luck that it stays that way.



Scheduled for mid-August, the 200 mile course – it would turn out to be 203 miles which took her team 32 continuous hours to complete – would weave its way in and out of Minnesota and neighboring Wisconsin. Steph talked about gearing up for a training schedule, and, of course, gearing up for gear. Naturally, it



would be nifty, new gear – shoes, pants, top, jacket, safety vest, and safety head lamp. She already had a training app installed on her phone. Oh, and her team would need a name, so she was working on some possible suggestions.

Fast forward to August. The day before the race, I received an email from Steph with an attached

photo. It showed the back window of a van with “Team Ruckus” artistically emblazoned in large letters.

Hmm, could our younger Flat-Coat, Ruckus, have been the inspiration for their team name?

Possibly. Ruckus is an intense and fast retriever. At any field event he simply
